Chicago, May 14.—Yesterday was the hottest May 13th in weather history in this city for at least twenty-eight years.

While the mercury at the weather bureau recorded 86 degrees, street thermometers in the shade all over the city registered 90 degrees and some of the more ambitious recorders touched the 92 mark. The weather reports over the country revealed the following temperatures:

Winnipeg, 92; St. Paul, 90; Milwaukee, 80; Des Moines, 88; Omaha, 88.

Chicago, May 14.—The first centennial anniversary of the birth of John Brown will be celebrated at Bethel church tonight. The address will be delivered by Dr. J. W. K. Bawn, of the Gamma Theological Seminary, Atlanta, Ga.

Other speakers will be ex-Judge W. B. Beadwell, ex-Judge Harvey B. Hurd of Evanston, who was the head of the society that shipped food and other supplies to the anti-slavery party in Kansas, and Mrs. John Jones, who secreted Brown in her house when there was a price set on his head.
