To the Editor:

I have just returned from a trip through the Hood River valley, where I was pleased to find the sentiment very strongly in favor of A. S. Blowers for county judge. There are some 500 voters in that part of the county, composed of shrewd, industrious farmers, fruit men and lumber men. They deserve recognition in the distribution of the county offices, and they will do their part to obtain it by rolling up a large vote for Mr. Blowers. It is well known that I am not a republican. My desire to see Mr. Blowers elected springs solely from the confidence that I have that he will make one of the best judges the county has ever had, and that he will do all in his power to reduce the taxes. Mr. Blowers is himself a large property owner. He has spent fourteen years of his life in the very work he will be called upon to do as county judge.
