"Shanghai, Aug. 3 .- Secretary of state, Washington-Americans left Chunkin yesterday. Li told the French consul todey that no message will be delivered to Furthermore the Punishment Should the ministers because the foreigners are advancing on Pekin. Two pro-foreign members of the Tsung li Yamun were beheaded on the 27th for urging the preservation of the ministers, by La Ping Han, now commanding the troops in Pekin. He ordered the Pao Ting massacre.

CHE Foo, Afternoon, Aug. 2 .- Secretary of state, Washington-Just received telegram from governor of Shan Tung, requesting me to transmit to you the following: 'Have just received a telegram, dated July 30, from the Tsung li Yamun, stating that various ministers, the German legation and others (foreigners), all well; not in distress. Provisions were repeatedly sent. Relations most friendly. Now conferring as to proper measures to protect various ministers to Tien Tein for temporary sheiter, which conference will soon be ended. Missionaries From China.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5 .- The transport Logan arrived at midnight, 39 days from Manila, via Nagasaki and Yokohama. She is understood to have on board a number of refugee missionaries from China, but no one will be landed until after the vessel is inspected by the quarantine officer.
