The Wheat Trade.

The Portland Commercial Review of August 23d. says:

The past week has been a quiet one in wheat circles, yet under ordinary circumstances the volume of business which has been done throughout the Pacific Northwest would be considered very large, as more wheat has passed out of primary hands than for the same time during any previous season. In many sections of the interior farmers have sold at current prices, and by so doing have placed themselves in easy circumstances. In other localities a disposition to hold back supplies is noted, in anticipation of obtaining higher figures later on. On the whole, enough wheat has passed from the first hands into those of exporters to meet any tonnage contracts, and present appearances warrant the belief that vessels from this port will receive prompt dispatch. In and around Pendleton and other large points in Umatilla county there has been keen competition on the part of buyers, and in many instances farmers have realized prices which were above the spot value here. Liberal purchases on the basis of 58c per bu. have been made, and in a few cases high prices were paid. In the Palouse country 46c per bu. was paid, which is much above the export value at this port. In the Valley competition is quite active and millers are paying 60c and 62c at home. Exporters are not figuring very much on valley wheat this season. Farmers generally are making heavy deliveries at shipping points, but to date wheat has not been received here in any large amount. The movement during September is expected to be very large and the outlook for heavy receipts from the interior and very liberal exports from the Columbia river and Puget Sound during the season is very propitious. The latest information from Eastern Oregon and Washington is that the total output this season will be larger than that of last year, but the Valley will fall off considerably. The quality of Walla Walla wheat is a great deal better than last season, Valley also showing better qualities. Winter wheat is all cut and most of it threshed. Spring grain is being cut. Local prices here for Walla Walla Club 54c, 57c for Blue Stem, and Valley 56c per bushel.

British Still Suffer Losses.

LONDON, Aug. 22.—The war office has received the following dispatch from Lord Roberts, dated August 21:

"Lieutenant-Colonel Stillwell, reconnoitering near Ventersburg, engaged the Boers. Two British were wounded. Lieutenants Spedding, Davenport, Surtees and Watson, and a medical officer and twenty-four men are missing.

"Hamilton has crossed the Crocodile River.

"Paget and Baden-Powell engaged the commands protecting Dewet August 20th. Lieutenant Flowers and one man were killed. Lieutenant Kirby and six men were wounded."

Implicated in the Plot.

PRESORIA, Tuesday, Aug. 21.—The trial of Lieutenant Cordua, formerly of the Transvaal artillery, on the charge of being concerned in the plot to kidnap General Lord Roberts, was concluded today.

The prisoner was found guilty of all the counts in the indictment against him, but sentence was deferred until the findings of the court shall have been confirmed by Lord Roberts.
