OREGON HISTORICAL SOCIETY. Its Rooms in Portland a Place of Intense Interest.

While in Portland last Saturday the editor of this paper spent a short time in the rooms of the Oregon Historical Society on the top floor of the city hali. The visit was a revelation. He had no ides of the hundreds of intensely interesting relies of the discovery and settlement of the Oregon territory that this useful society has gathered together. These relics fill a number of large rooms. Many of them are heirlooms of families that figured in the early history of this country, and date back to periods long entedating the birth of any one now living. Many of them are connected with important crises in Oregon history or with pioneers whose names have become household words in the Far West. They are of every conceivable kind, from a big sea chest that was in the ship Columbia when the great River of the West was discovered to the first wagon that crossed the plains, the first printing press ever operated west of the Rockies, books and pamphlets and newspapers fifty to one hundred years old, a chair owned by General, then Lieutenant Sheridan : one of the cannon bails that he fired at the Indians at the Cascades in the memorable attack on the blockhouse in 1856, dutch ovens and pans and spiders and guns and rifles that crossed the plains with the early pioneers, and hundreds of other things each and all having a history, than which the writer can conceive no sublunary subject more interesting to an Oregonian.

We write this that others may enjoy a treat that for us was, alas, all too short. We could have spent a week in the rooms and enjoyed every moment of the time. The rooms are free to visitors who are cordially welcomed by the officials in charge. Mr. Himes politely left his desk and spent nearly an hour pointing out the objects of more than ordinary interest and answering questions.

If the reader of these lines is an Oregonian and has never visited the rooms of the Oregon Historical Society he has missed the treat of a lifetime. We shall certainly pay them another visit at the very first opportunity.

Tell Mr, Bryan for us that before he turns these magnificent islands and nine-tenths of their poor, ignorant and deceived inhabitants over to a band of murderous Tagals or the rapacity of foreign invaders, he will have to whip into subjection 65,000 of as brave and patriotic American soldier boys as ever fired a gun or drew a sword."

CLERKS' INSURANCE.

Successful Operation of Departmental Aid Association in Government Offices.

"A few years ago," said the secretary of a departmental aid association, reports the Washington Star, "one of the abuses of departmental life was the almost constant passing around of the hat for collections to aid the widow and family of a clerk who had died in serv-

"Very often the deceased had been for many years in the service of the government and at his death it would found that he left scarcely enough to bury him, and sometimes not that. And this would be true of clerks in the higher grades. It made a clerk appear mean to refuse to contribute with the others, though he may have bad but a speaking acquaintance with the deceased. To those on the outside it would not seem that these contributions would be made sufficiently often to amount to a drain, but they were, and I have known of three clerks dying within a month in one large division. I recall the chief clerk of a bureau dying suddenly, and his widow did not have enough money to pay for his laying the bureau that the chief expected the clerks to contribute liberally, and most of them handed in from \$3 to \$5, but there was a strong undercurrent of kicking.

"In all of the departments the soliciting of money for any purpose is strict. and expense ly forbidden now. All have their own ther notice. benevolent associations, which are en-couraged by the chiefs. These associntions have by-laws, constitutions and officers. Their object is to furnish to the clerks who are members an insurance which will be immediately available on death. In fact, the money is turned over to the heirs on the same day that the association is notified of the death of the member, and this ready money is often all that the widow or the heirs have in the world.

"The Pension Bureau association publishes a complete pamphlet report annually; others render a report to the board of directors only. The annual receipts from the assessments of the Pension Bureau association are about \$6,600, and \$250 is paid on death to the beneficiary. Last year it lost about 25 members, and \$36,000 has been disbursed since its formation in 1891. The assessment is 25 cents, and the membership is 1,060. Clerks do not lose their membership in these associations if they retire from their respective departments, voluntarily or involuntarily, as long as they pay their assessments. The assessments range from 25 cents to \$1.

"In the post office department the as-sessment is 50 cents, and the amount paid varies from \$200 to \$275, according to the number of members.

"The treasury department has two ald associations, one of which pays \$250 on the death of a member and the assessment is \$1.

"The interior departments association numbers about 900, and it was organized in 1895. About 100 members bursed.

The corset has been relegated to obscurity by many of the most fashlonable young women of Philadelphia. Mme. Goches Sarrante, who believes that women wearing the unhygienic thing should be punished by law, has September 17 to 22, 1900. rallied a host of followers from Philadelphia around her flag.

Led by Dr. Grace Spiegel, of the normal school, many of the young girls of Philadelphia are bunding together against this article of feminine wear. They consider it not mildly unhygienic, but actively harmful. Dr. Spiegel's opinions on the question are:

"It is really wicked for women, and especially growing girls, to force They need free play of muscles to give them the best physical and mental health; they need loose clothing to allow free play of muscle. No need, as some think, of a girl's looking untidy because she does not wear corsets to deform her natural figure. She can be nest, carry herself properly and M. D. WISDOM, Sec., Portland, Or. allow free play of muscle. No need, as be neat, carry herself properly and feel happier without them.'

"Wu Ting Fang, the Chinese minister; puts the wearing of corsets on a par with foot-binding," said a memher of the Society of the Philadelphia Woman's Medical College the other day. She knows, because she has been assisting in th entertainment of the distinguished foreigner during his recent visit to that city, "In his address to our alumnae," continued the medical woman, "he cited the Chinese dress as one mark of the emancipation of the women of his country and their superiority over Americans."
