

## Talked on the Subsidy Bill.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Senator Hanna was one of the attractions of the senate this morning, because of his speech favoring the ship-subsidy bill, while the Clark senatorial question and the British treaty were added features, and, consequently, the galleries were crowded.

Senator Hanna offered a resolution directing the president to open negotiations with Great Britain for abrogation of the Clayton-Bulwer treaty. It was laid on the table.

Senator Hanna began his speech, citing the case of lake marine growth as an example of what had been achieved. He declared what was true of the commerce elsewhere.

Hanna further said he did not propose to run away from the tongue of slander or the imputations of improper motives, in connection with the ship subsidy bill, made by some of the opponents of the measure. There are many people favorable to the upbuilding of the merchant marine, but they have been misled and influenced by the misrepresentations apparently willfully made. The passage of this bill declared Hanna, will create in five years more of a ship capacity than we have now in all our yards. Hanna completed his speech at 2 o'clock, and the senate went into executive session. In the house the holiday recess was fixed from December 21 to January 3.

## Must Show Cause.

TACOMA, Wash., Dec. 13.—A writ of mandamus has been issued by Judge Linn, directing Gov. John E. Rogers to show cause on January 4th next why he should not fill the vacancies on the state capitol commission and proceed to sell the lands, 30,000 acres, granted by the United States, and issue warrants for the completion of the capitol building at Olympia, in accordance with the contract awarded to Fenton H. Goss, of Tacoma, in 1896, for \$822,951. Goss began work and completed the basement. He claims damages in the sum of \$200,000. The mandate also includes Robert Bridges, land commissioner; Frank J. Browne, superintendent of public instruction; William D. Jenkins, secretary of state, and Neal Cheatham, state auditor.

## Senate Adopts the Treaty Amendment.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—The senate adopted the foreign relations committee amendment to the Hay-Pauncefote treaty by a vote of 65 to 17.

The senate continued its discussion of the Hay-Pauncefote treaty before taking a vote on the foreign relations committee amendment at 3 o'clock. The doors were closed at 2:05 p. m., and immediately thereafter Senator Elkins took the floor. He advocated the amendment and said he thought it should be even much stronger in its provision for the defense of the proposed canal than it is.

NEW YORK, Dec. 13.—An afternoon paper here announces that former Queen Lilianakalani is critically ill, at the Presbyterian hospital, this city with typhoid fever. Inquiry at the hospital brings a denial that such a patient is there. The story alleges she came from Washington on the first of the month and was admitted as a private patient.

It is a patriotic, as well as a fraternal order. The local order expects the grand guardian, Mrs. C. C. VanOrsdal, to visit them soon, when a public meeting will be given. Mrs. VanOrsdal is an eloquent speaker and talks fraternity straight out.

## Statehood of Arizona.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 13.—A strong fight is to be made in congress for the admission of Arizona as a state. It has been the understanding with politicians that when the territory would elect a republican delegate to congress, thereby showing that there was little likelihood of adding two democrats to the senate, that statehood would be conferred on the territory. That has now been done by a large majority. The citizens of Arizona no longer go about the towns loaded down with shooting irons, and all the implements which marked the barbarism of the territory a dozen years ago have been relegated to the past. The increase in population has been remarkable, while its agricultural, mining and stock industries all seem to warrant the placing of the territory on a footing of equality with other portions of the country where civilization has been permanently established.
