"Everybody seems to be very busy around this place," remarked a gentleman who dropped in to order The Evening News. "Busy? Well, yes. But that is what we are here for; so just continue to stop in. Dairying is an industry that has, as yet, been given little attention in Douglas county, but in every instance where the business is followed intelligently the farmer has found a paying proposition. Shipping facilities within the whole county are fairly good, and most farmers in the valleys tributary to railway can get their product to market within a very few hours. There are at present three creameries in Douglas county, one at Gardiner, the second at Oakland, and the third, perhaps the oldest and largest institution of its kind in the county, at Roseburg. These creameries pay the highest market price in cash for cream, and each has a capacity for much more than they are at present getting. Cattle are exceptionally well in our section of the state, and the cost of feed, on account of the grazing afforded, is reduced to a minimum. A few cows well cared for will bring in more ready cash a month than most any business the farmer of small capital can engage in. The county offers exceptional opportunities for those who would engage in this work, and Douglas county dairy products should aggregate hundreds of thousands of dollars annually.

**County Court Orders.**

In the matter of the balance of the road apportionment from the general road fund to the several road districts. It is ordered that one-half of one mill on the assessed valuation be apportioned to each road district. The clerk was ordered to draw a warrant on the general road fund for the amount due each district.

In the matter of the petition of W. E. Marshall and others for the location of a county road in district No. 51, commencing at a point 33.68 chains north and 4.29 chains west of the SE corner of section 28, tp. 30, S. R. 2 W. and terminating at a point 28.33 chains due west of ¼ corner, common to sections 2 and 4, tp. 30, S. R. 2 west. Ordered that the same be continued until January, 1910.

In the matter of a deed from Fred Selbert and wife for a certain strip of land for a county road in district No. 44. Ordered that the Board of county road viewers make a report on same.

His short life's record is as a pebble thrown upon the great sea of society, producing at first but a ripple upon the waves, which will widen and widen unto the eternal shore.
