An adjourned meeting of the members of the Roseburg Commercial Club will be held this evening. Resolutions advocating the erection of the federal building in this city will be read, and if acceptable, will be ordered forwarded to Oregon's representatives at Washington. The citizens in this vicinity are very anxious that the federal building shall be built, therefore they will exert their efforts in hope of obtaining the aid of those persons who are in a position to bring about a materialization.

Word has been received in the city to the effect that the appeal case of Attorney Albert Abraham, appellant, vs. City of Roseburg, respondent, will come up for hearing before the Oregon Supreme Court on November 22. In a brief furnished by Mr. Abraham he contends that the city charter of Roseburg is insufficient to warrant the collection of a city license. He also alleges that the collecting of a city license represents double taxation. The case in question has been hanging fire for some time and the decision will be received with interest. Abraham was defeated in the circuit court, a decision having been rendered in favor of the city. Should the decision of the lower court be reversed by the Supreme Court city licenses will undoubtedly be a thing of the past in Roseburg.

Vivian, the 17 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Chambers, of this city was arrested last evening by Marshal Phillips, of Oakland, and Constable Wright, of Roseburg, charged with the theft of a saddle, valued at \$12, and a revolver. It appears that Chambers recently obtained employment at Oakland, and while at that city borrowed a saddle of Earl Lewis, promising to return the same yesterday. Failing to return as per agreement, the owner went in search of Chambers. After investigation he found he had shipped the saddle to Roseburg, disposing of it at a local second-hand store. The revolver included among the plunder, was found in a toilet in the depot at Oakland. It is said that Chambers has confessed the entire affair, undoubtedly of the opinion that he would fare much better in relating the truth than otherwise. Owing to his age he will be brought to trial before County Judge Wonnacott, probably tomorrow afternoon.

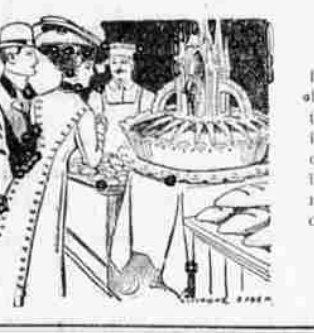
