## City News Briefly Recorded

The streets received the first genuine cleaning yesterday afternoon, and to say the least, presented a very creditable appearance.

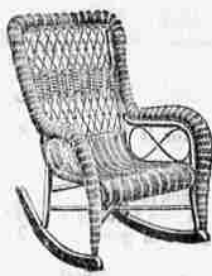
