RELICS OF WAR OF 1812

Paintings From Guerriere Taken to Navy Department

Two old paintings which were ripped from the walls of the captain's cabin of the British frigate Guerriere before that ship went down after her flight with Old Ironsides, have just come into the possession of the Navy Department. Acting Secretary Beekman Winthrop has determined to send them to Boston, to be placed on the Constitution as trophies of her most noted fight, the first great victory of the war of 1812.

These two paintings will take rank among the most prized war relics of the country. The wood frames have blackened with age, and the canvases are in some places cracked. Despite this, they are in good state of preservation. So far as can be learned the subjects have never been known since they were taken from the Guerriere. One represents what is probably an Egyptian scene, and the other is a carefully done picture of a Corinthian temple, resembling the Parthenon.

The paintings were captured by Commodore Isaac Hull, when he matched the old Constitution against the guns of the Guerriere. The Guerriere was so severely damaged in the fight that he deemed it impossible to get her into port, and ordered her to be blown up. Before destroying her, he sent an officer on board to secure something from her as a relic, and the officer with his sword cut from the panels of the captain's cabin these paintings. Since that time they have remained in the possession of Commodore Hull's family.

Their existence first became known when Isaac Hull Platt, a descendant of the Commodore, living in Wallington, Pa., forwarded them to the Secretary of the Navy, with a note of explanation. In his letter he said:

"Commodore Isaac Hull was the brother of my maternal grandfather, Levi Hull, of Derby, Conn. These paintings were left in the custody of his brother's wife, Mary Hull, nee Wheeler, with directions to keep them until he should call upon her for them. He never did call upon her for them, and they remained in her possession until his death in 1843. Commodore Hull had no children, and I am his next of kin, and the pictures after the death of my grandmother came to me as a part of his personal estate."

The pictures were exhibited publicly once, during the Civil War. They were placed on show at the fair held in Brooklyn, N. Y., for the benefit of the sanitary commission, and at that time they created something of a sensation. Since that time they have been lost to the public.

THE STORM FEARFUL

Between Camas Valley and Myrtle Point

From Lewis McMillan who drove his team to this city and arrived yesterday it is learned that the storm was of a very violent order from Camas Valley to the first town on the Coquille. He left Myrtle Point Tuesday noon. The rain fell in torrents all along the route, the wind reached the velocity of a gale and water literally poured down the mountain sides. Trees were uprooted in every direction, and in making the trip he met with trees prostrate across the road, water that often looked dangerous, and mud and washouts without end.

There has been no telephone communication between Camas Valley and Myrtle Point since the commencement of the storm, and he judged that the line is down and out in a hundred places between the points named. When he came over the repairer had got into communication with Remote and expected to say "hello" to Roseburg all right that day.

No one could make the trip through last Monday, the first to succeed was on Tuesday, and it is likely the mail will have to be packed through on horses for several days.

It was the worst storm that the country has seen for many years, and time will be required to clear away the wreck of trees and fill in the washouts.
