THE NEWCOMERS IDEA

Every farmer realizes the enormous losses resulting from the use of farm seeds infested with the seeds of weeds. There is not only the immone losses resulting from the use of farm sends infested with the seeds of weeds. There is not only the immediate loss to the farmer using the seed, but the far greater loss of the permanent infestation of the neighborhood. So far as we know, the State of Wisconsin is the first to apply the principles of the pure food law to the seed trade. Duving the present year the state enacted a law forbidding the sale of seeds in lots or packages of more than one pound weight taless accompanied by a label stating among other things the percentage of purity and germinating power, and also the names of the weeds, if any, with whose seeds the seed is infested. If the infestation is greater than one in one thousand the seed must not be sold at all except for grinding. The law is a rather long one and contains many details which we have not space to men. long one and contains many details long one and contains many details which we have not space to mention, but the essence of it all is that it proposes that all persons buying seed shall know precisely what they are getting.
