NEW PAPER.

Klamath Falls to Have a Third
Daily.

Klamath Falls, Or., Jan. 13.—Kla-
math Falls is to have a new daily pa-
per to be established by a stock com-
pany organized by business men and
property owners of the city and coun-
try. 314

The movement has been under con-
sideration for some time and at a
meeting held today, about 40 repre-
sentative business men attend-
ing. It was said that subscriptions al-
ready pledged assured the successful
launching of the publication. It is
probable the first issue will appear
within 30 days. This will be the
third daily in Klamath Falls, but the
first to receive a telegraphic news
service, as it is the purpose to secure
the Associated Press report. 314

FATAL SHOOTING AFFRAY.

Two Old Men of Josephine County
Principles.

Grants Pass, Jan. 13.—Another
murder has been added to Josephine
county's long list. Tuesday afternoon
James McGuire shot and killed Angus
Knappa following a dispute over a
copper prospect on the Illinois river,
about 40 miles from this city. 314

The first news came from McGuire
who telephoned in to the sheriff as
to what he had done and then came
in yesterday morning and gave him-
self up. His story is that Knappa was
attempting to jump his claim and
was making threats against his life,
and that while he was going down
to his mine yesterday he noticed
Knappa skulking off in the brush
near the trail. 314

Thinking his life was in danger he
immediately fired with his 35-30 ri-
fle three shots and then came off and
left the body. 314

Both were old men, being over 60
years of age. McGuire has been in
shooting scrapes before and bears the
reputation of being a bad gun man.
In the presence of the sheriff, Mc-
Guire stood exhausted from his long
night's ride and in a low voice with-
out any signs of nervousness told the
story of the killing and directed oth-
ers what to do with his private af-
fairs. 314

It was about 11 o'clock Tuesday
when I came down the trail to make
coffee, and saw the brush move at
the side of the trail," he said. "I
took a good look and recognized
Knappa standing there. As I had
been forewarned he had been laying
for me, I shot with good aim. I never
went near the body, but it never
hurt him—he just lay down. The
body is there now. I tell you, boys,
I was shooting for marbles. I knew
what I was doing as I had been fairly
warned. But everything will be all
right if I can get a fair investiga-
tion. 314

"Ever since I have been working
in the presence of Knappa he has al-

ways watched me. Then, too, he put
up a notice that I was not doing as-
sessment work and that he would kill
my dog. I have had to keep every-
thing hid lately." 314

A few years ago McGuire took a
shot at Joe Connors, but got a shot in
his shoulder. He has to his credit
taking out his watch and giving a
man five minutes to get off his claim.
He is a man of iron nerve. After
the murder took place he saddled his
mule and rode to Selma, over a
mountain trail, 15 miles, ordered sup-
per at the hotel, then telephoned to
the sheriff that he was on his way to
give himself up. He rode all night
and arrived here this morning at 4
o'clock. 314
