District Attorney Brown decided to admit the contents of the affidavit as true, therefore the case will come up for trial tomorrow.

The civil case of H. McClallen vs. E. E. Labrie, an action to recover the sum of \$516, alleged to be due for feed, pasture and labor, is attracting the attention of a jury in the circuit court this afternoon. The plaintiff alleges that he fed and cared for considerable stock belonging to the defendant, and that to date he has been unable to collect the sum alleged in the complaint. Labrie, the defendant, brought into court a cross claim, alleging that the plaintiff is indebted to him in the sum of \$409.60. Attorneys Cardwell & Watson are representing the plaintiff while Attorneys Coshow & Rice are looking after the interests of the defendant. The case will probably go to the jury late this afternoon.

DR. COOK SAID TO BE IN GERMANY

(Special to The Evening News.) FRANKFURT, Germany, Jan. 18.—Dr. Frederick A. Cook, the Arctic explorer, lies critically ill at a sanitarium near Heidelberg, according to a statement published in the Zeitung today. Cook's nerves are said to be shattered and his mind is in danger of derangement from melancholy, and he has suffered a serious physical collapse. It was also reported that Mrs. Cook was with her husband, but that part of the report is not verified. Zeitung stated that the paper is pledged to not make public the place of Cook's retreat.

\$12,000 INCOME A YEAR

Illinois Woman Makes That Amount Off of Sixty Cows

At a recent meeting of the Kane County, Illinois, farmers institute at Geneva, Mrs. Scott Durand gave the members a surprise in telling her experiences in dairying. When a questioner asked her what she attributed her success to, she answered: "Because I am a woman."

Mrs. Durand caused a surprise when she said her profits from a herd of sixty cows was \$12,000 last year. Asked what she did with the money, she said she spends it in keeping a free kindergarten in Chicago.

"I became interested in the question of good milk for babies," said Mrs. Durand, "and the more I tried the more fascinated I became. The outrages perpetrated upon the people by careless and money grabbing milkmen made my blood boil, and I made up my mind that I would show them how to run a dairy, and at the same time milk the dairy barn as clean and wholesome as my own kitchen."
