WALSH IN PRISON.

Obeys Orders and Falls Into Routine at Once.

Leavenworth, Kan., Jan. 21.—"I slept very well, thank you," replied John R. Walsh, the former Chicago banker, in response to the greeting of a guard this morning at the Federal prison here.

When the gong sounded at 5:30 this morning for the prisoners to arise, he was on his feet promptly.

When the line formed the new prisoner simply took his place and moved toward the breakfast room.

Breakfast over, all were returned to their cells to rest before the day's work should begin at 7:30.

From Dr. Yohe's office Walsh was taken to the office of William McClungby, a son of the warden and special agent of the department of justice, in charge of the Bertillon system.

Walsh's first full day here proved fortunate. While he ate all his meals with the other prisoners and must return to his cell tonight, today he was permitted to sit around the Bertillon agent's room and read or rest, at will.

CORNER BEEF.

How to Cure, Keep Fresh and Cook It Right.

While salt beef is not as nutritious nor so digestible as fresh meat, it has its place.

A vein rising on brine is a sign that it is not in good condition. Seal it and add more salt, sugar and salt-peter, keeping the original proportions of each, or else throw it away.

What pieces to buy for cornings is the next question. Some housewives select a solid piece from the round, but it is a more common way to buy cuts from the forequarter.

Beef that has been in brine but a few days is best put into boiling water to cook. As soon as the water boils again, skim well and set back where it will simmer until very tender.
