The regular January term of the circuit court practically reached an end this morning when Judge Hamilton excused the jury from further attendance. It was intended to take up the case of R. G. Young & Company vs. John Neuner et al. this morning, but owing to the fact that the issues were not made up the court deemed it wise to adjourn. Owing to the procedure of the court the case will not come up until the May term.

J. W. With the decorative light nests installed, impulses are prevalent relative to when the lights will be in actual operation. For the benefit of these "inquisitors" we will state that as yet the city council has made no arrangements with the electric light company relative to furnishing the necessary current, therefore it appears improbable that the lights will be in operation for at least six weeks. Should the council take some action at their next regular meeting, however, the electric light company avor that they will commence the work of stringing the necessary wires and installing the transformers without delay. This work they allege will consume about 30 days. The new system will cost the city \$120 per month, or about \$60 per month in addition to what they are paying for arc lights in the paved district at the present time. To reduce this expense to a nominal figure, however, the city intends to abolish eight of the latter lights, thus reducing the total cost of the lights materially.

The equity case of A. B. Chadbourne vs. Mary J. Perkins is attracting the attention of Judge J. W. Hamilton in the circuit court today. Both parties involved are residents of Drain and are well known throughout the entire county. The plaintiff is represented by Attorney O. P. Coshaw, while Attorney Caldwell is looking after the interests of the defendant.

Notwithstanding the fact that the circuit court jury was discharged this morning the grand jury is still grinding away, indications tending to show that they will continue in session until tomorrow evening, at least. As we go to press this afternoon the jury chamber is crowded with witnesses, some of whom are local citizens, while others are from a distance. Owing to the fact that the circuit court jury has been excused all indictments returned hereafter will probably be sealed.

In speaking of the fines imposed upon three of Roseburg's well known pool and billiard hall proprietors by Judge Hamilton in the circuit court this morning, District Attorney Brown said that he wished to send broadcast a warning to all young men under the age of 21 years who have been in the habit of frequenting these resorts. Quoting from the Oregon laws Mr. Brown informed a News reporter of the fact that any person under the age of 21 years who shall frequent a resort similar to those above mentioned and represent that he is over the age of 21 years, is liable to a fine of not less than \$10 or more than \$100, in default of which the person convicted may be compelled to serve the alternate in the county jail. From Mr. Brown's conversation it would appear that he is desirous of preventing difficulty from such a source.

Learning that the grand jury had returned an indictment charging him with the crime of defacing a cabin, Emmitt Overman, a mining prospector who has resided on North Myrtle Creek for the past few years, arrived in the city this morning and shortly thereafter made his whereabouts known to Sheriff Fenton. A complaint was lodged against Overman at a recent session of the grand jury, when George Carlson, who now appears as the prosecuting witness, alleged that Overman had visited his homestead, situated on North Myrtle Creek, and shattered his cabin, rendering it unfit for occupancy. Further Carlson claimed that Overman had no legal right to trespass on the land upon which the cabin was erected inasmuch as he had filed upon it under the homestead law. Overman, on the other hand, alleged that he owned the property, having filed upon it prior to Carlson under the mining act. Owing to the fact that the circuit court jury has been discharged it is probable that Overman's case will go over until the May term of court. Accordingly he will be placed under bonds to appear at that time.
