SURVEY PROGRESSING. Surveyors are Camped Between Coquille and Marshfield.

F. W. Stevens, in charge of the surveyors working on the Coos county end of the survey for the Coos Bay and Boise railroad, today moved his headquarters from Coquille to Marshfield and is now completing the final stretch of the work. His crew is now as far as the divide between Coos Bay and the Coquille valley, which is about ten miles from Marshfield. The crew will work out of here until the survey is completed.

While no official announcement has been made, it is the general understanding that the survey will not be completed to within a couple of miles of the bay until definite arrangements have been made for terminal facilities. There are two terminals now under consideration. One is said to come in by way of Libby and strikes the flats south of Marshfield and the other is to come down Isthmus or Catching inlet and make the terminals on Eastside.

Chief Engineer Haines is at Roseburg with President Clarke, where they are completing some of the preliminary work. The surveyors have completed the survey into that city and now all that remains to be done there is to check up the work. It is expected that will be accomplished soon and Chief Engineer Haines will return here to complete terminal arrangements, etc., here.

Progress on the bonus subscription canvass is making good progress and no difficulty is anticipated in securing the balance of the \$150,000 required.—Coos Bay Times.

S. P. CO. MUST HUSTLE. But Coos Bay People Will Offer No Bonuses.

The statement from Chief Engineer Hood that the Drain branch of the Southern Pacific is to be built, has caused no excitement. The people are no longer looking forward to that as the only show for railroad communication with the outside. The prospect for the Coos Bay & Idaho line is looking so good that the interest in the construction of the Drain line is at low ebb. Furthermore no 4 per cent guarantee on \$5,000,000 has been made, nor will it be offered. If the Southern Pacific wants a share of the business of this section it will have to get in. The Coos Bay-Boise line will be built.—Myrtle Point Enterprise.
