

## News of the City Briefly Told

**Six Apply for Job.**—Six applicants have applied for Hymen Wollenberg's job as administrator of the Samuel Marks estate. A meeting of the heirs will be held in a day or two to decide on Mr. Wollenberg's successor.

**Purchase Orchard Tracts.**—A Hume, a prominent stockman of Miles City, Montana, and Robert Anderson, an oyster dealer from Tokelohd, Washington, have each purchased orchard tracts at New Wilbur and will engage in the orchard business. The sales were effected through the W. C. Harding Land Company.

**Will Meet This Evening.**—The Commercial Club will meet this evening for the purpose of electing representatives to attend the general county conference which will assemble in this city next Saturday for the purpose of formulating a plan of opposition to the proposed county division scheme. This conference will be composed of one representative from every 100 registered voters in the various precincts in the last general election.

**Cottage Prayer Meetings.**—At the Ministerial Association meeting this afternoon it was decided to hold 25 cottage prayer meetings in the various Christian homes in the city at 10 o'clock every morning. A committee was also appointed to meet with the Commercial Club to secure the co-operation of the club in request the business men of the city to have all places of business closed at 2 o'clock on the afternoon of the 16th.

**Enlarges Store.**—The New York Store, which opened up for business last summer, has found the quarters first used too small to accommodate sufficient goods to supply the demand for the constantly increasing trade, therefore has decided to use the entire lower floor of the building. To make room for the immense stock of merchandise the partitions have all been removed and the store presents quite a metropolitan appearance.

**Miss Risley Appointed Teacher.**—Miss Olivia Risley has been appointed teacher of language in the High school to succeed Miss Gertrude Clark, lately resigned. This appointment was made at the school board meeting this afternoon. Miss Risley was graduated from the state university last June with the degree of Bachelor of Arts, and is an accomplished and competent young woman. Aside from instructing the clerk to purchase a cartload of fire wood for the Lane school no further action was taken by the board.

**Asks Court to Admit Will.**—Robert O. Lehman, an heir of the late William C. Park, who died on the 17th of March, 1909, has filed a petition in the probate court asking the court to admit to probate a will which was executed by the testator on the 20th day of April, 1885, and which further than the testator's stepdaughter, Louisa Lehman, be required to produce this document in court. The petition recites that the will is still in the custody of Louisa Lehman. Louisa Lehman has filed a copy of a letter which was made by the testator in 1905. This letter will, the other three heirs of the estate attack on the ground that it was obtained from the testator under duress. These heirs are represented in this court by Attorney C. E. Johnson. The heirs involved represent assets and land to the value of about \$7,500.

### MAKES GREAT SACRIFICE.

Husband Gives Own Blood to Save Young Wife.

TACOMA, Feb. 14.—James Wood of North Carr street, gave freely of his life's blood today in an operation at Fannie Paddock hospital, in the hope of saving the life of his young wife, Lucy.

For some time Mrs. Wood has been in the hospital suffering from hemorrhages. It was finally decided that the only possible means of saving her life was by the infusion of new healthy blood into her veins. The situation was explained to Wood by Dr. F. W. Rinkenberger and he freely offered himself for the operation. It was performed in the presence of all the hospital nurses and many physicians. After an anesthetic had been administered, incisions were made in the arteries in the bodies of Wood and his wife and the two arteries were then bound together. For 30 minutes the healthy blood from the man's body was allowed to flow into the woman's veins. At the end of that time the arteries were again fastened separately. Although greatly weakened by his sacrifice, Wood appeared little the worse for it, while Mrs. Wood's condition is very much improved, and the surgeons state there is every prospect that she will recover.
