Admitted to Probate.

Judge Wonacott made an order today admitting to probate the will of Laura Ann Baldersee, who died at Bridges, Coos county, December 13, 1909, and appointing Martha Jane Brownell, executrix; also appointing Messrs. R. T. Ashworth, F. L. and Howard Calkins, appraisers of the estate. The estate is valued at \$3,000. Judge Wonacott has made an order citing Louisa Lehman to produce before him on the 21st of the present month, a will made by the late William C. Burke, on April 29, 1885, now in her custody.

Death of Mrs. Jane Coates.

Mrs. Martha Jane Coates, wife of the Rev. G. T. Coates, died at her home in this city at 12 o'clock yesterday. The funeral services took place this afternoon at the C. E. Coates residence on East Douglas street, and were conducted by the Rev. R. H. Dollarhide, of the Free Methodist church. Interment took place at the I. O. O. F. cemetery. She was a faithful and loving wife for 57 years and was the mother of fifteen children, ten of whom are living at the present time. She was born in Canboro, Canada, May 17, 1835, and was married to the Rev. G. T. Coates in 1852. She leaves a son living in Roseburg, Chas. E. Coates, the carpenter, and a daughter, Mrs. Mattie Patterson, at Winchester. Seven other children are living in Canada and one in the state of Kentucky.
