Ladies Will Form a Rose Club and Beautify the City.

Roseburg, the original "City of Roses," the favored home of that most beautiful of all flowering shrubs, has a rose club. Roseburg has become noted for its roses. Every variety of hybrids flourish here in the greatest luxuriance, beauty and profusion.

Up to this time, however, there has been no systematic and scientific culture of this beautiful queen of shrubs. Nature has been so bountiful in her bestowal of soil and sunshine and climatic conditions here that the rose has filled the world with fragrance and beauty and brought renown to Roseburg with scarcely no cultivation or attention at all.

This, now, is to be changed. The purpose of the new rose club is the systematic and scientific cultivation and propagation of the rose.
