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SUIT FILED.
Seeks to Recover Timber Valued at \$5,400.

The Portland Oregonian of today says:
Suit for the recovery of timber valued at \$5,400 was begun yesterday by the United States District Attorney against George Neuner, residing near Roseburg. It is charged that Neuner entered a homestead in 1903, but failed to establish a residence on the land or in any manner cultivate it.
Soon after securing possession of the land Neuner is charged with having moved a portable sawmill onto the land and begun a systematic cutting of timber which was manufactured into lumber and disposed of on the local markets. The government charges that out of 690,000 feet of boards secured by Neuner, less than 9000 feet were utilized in improvements on the property.
Neuner relinquished the filing to the United States in January, 1907.

EVERETT, Wash., March 1.—The west bound Spokane local passenger has been stalled in the mountains near Wellington since February 24. Reports in a fragmentary message received this afternoon is to the effect that the train has been wiped out by a snow slide. All wires are down and grave cars are entertained for all of the thirty passengers, who, it is reported, have been swept to the bottom of the canyon five hundred feet below. A relief train has been sent to the scene headed by a snow plow.
