WASHINGTON, March 17.—In a special message sent to congress this afternoon President Taft requested that seal fishing be prohibited on the Alaskan islands of St. Paul and St. George, and that the government assume absolute control of the islands, including the inhabitants and the seal herds. The lease of the North American Commercial company, now holding the islands, expires on April 30 of this year. The president recommends that congress repeal the provisions for the extension of the lease, and enact a law authorizing the department of commerce and labor to take charge of the islands. GRINNING SKELETON IN TREE. Growsom Sight Confronts Timber Cruiser.
