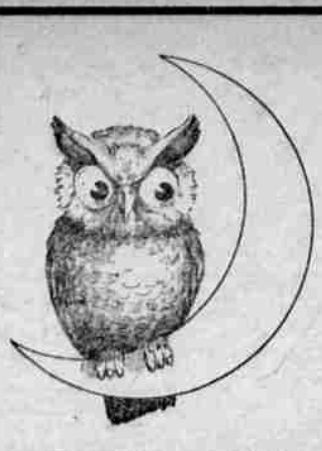
FLIES MOST EVIL OF THE INSECTS

Y. M. C. A. MOVEMENT.
Conduct in the Most Remarkable Crusade of Modern Times.
F. S. A. Smith, the Portland Y. M. C. A. secretary who is in the city today, is a sort of porcupine, bristling all over with good points about the institution he represents. The News man came in contact with him this morning and has been picking quills out of his system ever since. "The world-wide sweep of the Y. M. C. A. movement," said Mr. Smith, "is the most remarkable crusade of modern times. In the year 1909 over nineteen millions of dollars were spent in Y. M. C. A. buildings. In the city of Cleveland the other day the people raised \$1,040,000 for building purposes, and will erect one of the most magnificent Y. M. C. A. plants in the world. Portland has just finished a \$475,000 building, and Eugene last week dedicated a \$32,000 home. We hope soon to put up a monument to Y. M. C. A. industry in Roseburg." Mr. Smith will deliver a free lecture at the tabernacle this evening.

DEATH OF MRS. MORGAN.

Passed Away at Her Home in Cleveland Yesterday.
Mrs. Dora A. Morgan, wife of L. H. Morgan, of Cleveland, died at her home Sunday morning, March 20. The funeral took place at 10 o'clock today and was largely attended, numerous friends and relatives being present from this city. The deceased lady was born in Texas, June 14, 1854, and was, therefore, just 55 years, 9 months and 6 days old. She came to Douglas county when she was a young girl, where she was married and where she has ever since lived. Her husband, Mr. L. H. Morgan, is one of the early settlers of Douglas county, and is a well known and well-to-do farmer, both husband and wife being revered by a wide circle of friends. The departed lady, besides her husband, leaves five children, three sons and two daughters. One of her daughters is Mrs. Nettie Woodruff, who lives in Edenbower.
