Dr. M. E. Chambers, late of Gatebo, Oklahoma, is in the city today looking over the country with the intention of locating in this vicinity.

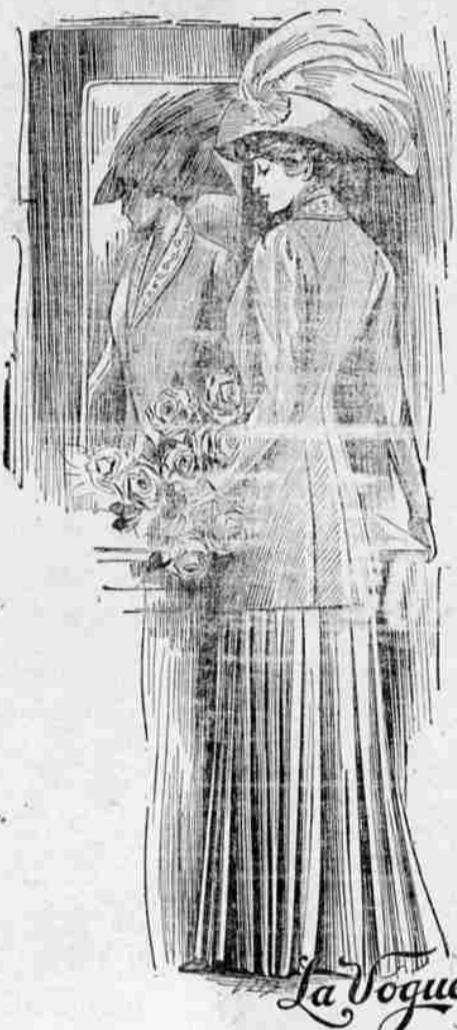
