**PAVEMENT PRICES GO DOWN.**

Mayor Simon is Hammering For a Closer Figure.

PORTLAND, March 26.—Asphalt paving dropped to \$1.44 a square yard yesterday afternoon. This was disclosed when bids were opened by the city executive board. Bitulithic, however, did not meet the cut. The Pacific Bridge company bid \$1.95 on bitulithic, a reduction of 5 cents, but it balanced this, it is said, by raising the cost of excavation. Mayor Simon declares he will demand a rate of \$1.75 for this material.

"I am not satisfied with the bid of the bitulithic companies," said the mayor after the session of the executive board, "and I have recommended to the street committee that the bids of the Warren Construction company and the Pacific Bridge company cut its bid on bitulithic 5 cents. I do not think that is enough, for I want the price of this pavement reduced to \$1.75. I would not, however, have recommended the rejection of the bitulithic bids had the rate been cut to \$1.85."

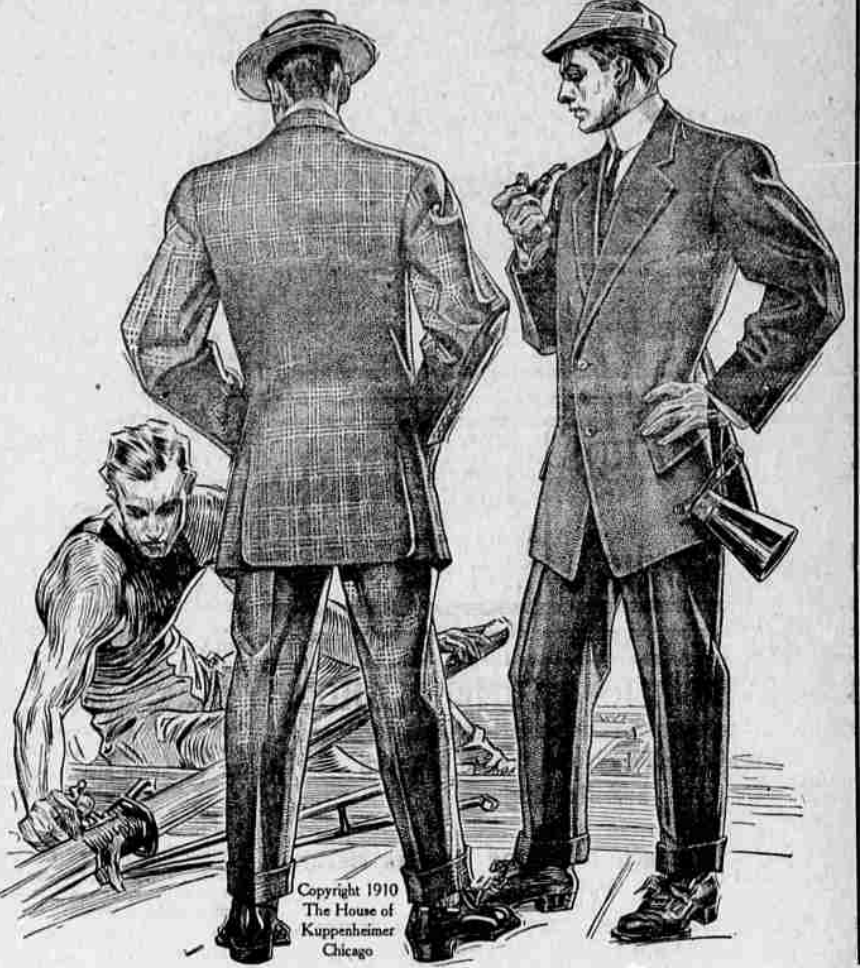
