PAVEMENT PRICES GO DOWN.

Mayor Simon is Hammering For a Closer Figure.

Closer Figure. PORTLAND, March 26.—Asphalt paving dropped to \$1.14 a square ward sesterday afternoon. This was disclosed when bids were onened by the city executive board. Bituilthic, however, difi not meet the cut. The Practic Bridge company bid \$1.95 on bituilthic, a reduction of 5 cents, but it balanced this, it is said, by rating the cost of execution. Mayor Simon declares he will demand a rate of \$1.75 for this material. "I am not satisfied with the bid of the bituilthic companies," said the major after the' session of the executive board. "and I have recom-mended to the street construction company and the Pacific Bridge company cut its bid on bituilthic 5 cents. I do not think that is enough, for I want the price of this pavement reduced to \$1.75. I would not, how-ever, have recommended the rejec-tion of the bituilthic bids had the rate been cut to \$1.85."
