Rumor has it that Minneapolis capitalists have purchased about 5000 acres of land in this vicinity and are still looking for more. It is understood that the land is to be divided into small tracts and sold as fruit farms. This doubtless will be a great benefit to this part of the world and will start a long needed wheel turn toward making the land produce in proportion to what is incorporated therein.

The city council met in regular session last Monday evening and threshed away at various measures for quite a spell, the chief topic being the matter of street improvement.

C. H. Daugherty submitted a proposition offering to furnish the city with rock uncrushed at 75 cents per yard, which would bring the finished product up to about \$1.75 per yard by the time it is placed on the street.

The rock in question will be furnished from "rocky bench" northwest of town and it will be necessary to build a tramway and a chute in order to get the rock to where it can be reached by a rock crusher.

Last Monday evening about 8:30 o'clock the Thiel family living about two miles north of town were aroused by the dog barking savagely in the vicinity of the smoke house.
