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BRUTAL HANGING.

Was the Most Grossest Ever Witnessed at Walla Walla Prison.

WALLA WALLA, May 13.—The thirteen hanging in the Walla Walla prison occurred today was the most gruesome ever witnessed within the prison walls. For twenty minutes after Richard Quinn dropped through the trap he hung, pleading with his executioners to draw him up again and let him drop to end the terrible agony he was experiencing. The condemned man was brave to the last and would not receive a priest to console him during his last few hours before the hanging. The trap was sprung at two minutes after five o'clock this morning and his body shot to the end of the rope. Quinn shouted "My God, this is awful, haul me up boys; drop me again. Hurry, take me back and let me drop again." The cries of the doomed man lasted for several minutes. Finally, he wavered and life was extinct at 5:22. Quinn was hanged for murdering his wife at Everett, Wash.
