Paving bids will be awarded June 20, and from that time on until fall there will be a small army of laborers at work getting the streets ready for the final surfacing. It is a "dry" town to be sure, but there is no grass growing in the busy thoroughfares of old Roseburg.

In a letter from a farmer just received the question is propounded: "Do hogs pay?" Honestly compels us to reply that a great many hogs do not. They take the paper for several years and then instruct the postmaster to return it to the office marked "refused" or "gone East."

From all parts of the state are heard expressions of satisfaction over the progress of the government's case against the Oregon & California railroad in the matter of opening to settlement some three million acres of lands, most of which is located in Southern Oregon. These lands were granted under expressed conditions for an express purpose. From the very start fraud, on the part of the company accepting the grant, has been practiced, and instead of these lands becoming a factor of development of the state, as was designed by the people when the grants were established, they have, on the contrary, under the policy of the holding company, been a detriment, owing to the fact that exorbitant prices, in violation of the terms of the grant, have been demanded for the holdings, or they have been withdrawn from market altogether. After a decade of inaction the government has finally gotten down to work in the interest of the people. There should be no further delay in this important matter. Public opinion will not sanction legal technicalities interposed in the interest of the defendant company or its successors. The lands involved in this controversy belong to the people and should speedily be opened to settlement.

THOMAS PERRY MAUPIN.

The subject of this sketch was a native son of Oregon. He was born in Lane county on February 4th, 1857 and died at Roseburg on April 13th, 1910.

Age 53 years, 2 months and 9 days. He came from that sturdy pioneer stock that made up the rank and file of the early settlers of Oregon, being the son of Garret Maupin and the late Martha A. Maupin, of Kellogg, who preceded him to the grave but a year ago.

He was a single man, devoting his life to the care of his aged mother,



believing that to be his first and greatest duty. As a neighbor he was kind and obliging, ever ready to run an errand for a friend or distressed neighbor. He was a charitable man, as the many deeds of kindness at his hands bear witness, ever ready to devote time and money for the betterment of his fellow man. He was not a member of any church, but he possessed many traits of character worthy of emulation. All in all he was a good man, and in his death Kellogg has lost one of its best citizens.

In our memory will he live for many years to come.
