LAND ELIMINATED.

Located in the Wallowa National
Forest—203,635 Acres

Washington, June 13.—The president has signed a proclamation eliminating 203,635 acres from the Wallowa National Forest, Oregon. The elimination is the result of a careful examination made by the U. S. Department of Agriculture during the past summer, which disclosed the fact that the areas now eliminated were either open grass land with very little timber or timbered areas so largely alienated that further administration by the forest service was considered impracticable. The lands released are not needed for watershed protection, and are not considered to be chiefly valuable for National Forest purposes.

The principal eliminations occur in townships 1 and 2 south, range east, township 1 and 8 north, ranges 45, 46, 47 and 48 east, township 3 north, range 42 east, township 4 north, range 42 and 43 east, township 5 and 6 north, range 46 east, and township 6 north, range 47 east. In addition, a strip of land from one-half mile to three miles wide is eliminated along the southern boundary of the forest, in range 42 to 47 east. Section 6 and the west half of section 5, township 4 north, range 42 east, is transferred from the Wallowa to the Wenaha forest, the area having been isolated from the Wallowa by the large eliminations.

The unappropriated portions of the areas eliminated by this proclamation will be restored to settlement and entry having been advertised in the local papers by the Secretary of the Interior.

REGULATE SALE OF LIQUOR.

Petition Filed Proposed to Amend
Constitution.

SALEM, Ore., June 11.—N. C. Dickinson and Phil Metschan, Jr., presented a petition at the office of the secretary of state late yesterday afternoon for filing which proposes to amend the Oregon constitution so that cities and towns may have complete control over the regulation of the sale of liquor. If this amendment is adopted all cities and towns from the operation of the present local option law.

The local option law provides that the vote of a county in favor of the prohibition of the sale of liquor will also prohibit the sale of liquor in the cities of that county notwithstanding they may have voted to allow the sale of liquor. If one county alone is not sufficiently large to accomplish the result, counties may be grouped and voted in bunches.

The petitions prescribed for filing yesterday contained more than 4000 names. It is the 15th message that the people will be called to pass upon at the next general election in November.
