QUALIFICATIONS OF VOTERS.
What is Necessary For You to Do to Comply With Law.

Registration of voters for the primary election on September 24, next, and for the general election on November 8, began June 8 in the office of the county clerk and before all justices of the peace in Douglas county and such notaries as have applied for the necessary blanks. All previous registrations of voters are of no further effect. The new registrations are valid for all elections for the next two years.
Only republicans and democrats are eligible to hold primary nominating elections, and any voter wishing to participate therein must designate himself as a member of those parties when he registers. Other parties who may wish to place a ticket in the field at the general election can do so by the petition method.
The books for the primaries will close on September 14. For the continuance of registration for the general election the books will re-open on September 29, closing a month later. The qualification of an elector is as follows: Any white male citizen of the United States, 21 years of age and over, who has resided in this state six months and in the precinct 30 days, and any alien who has declared his intention one year prior to the election and has the above qualifications is entitled to register.

Cities Ask Privileges That Are Denied Country.

MUST "SHOW" VINSON

Coles Valley Farmer Wants to Know Why Law Should Not Apply to Everybody—Voters Not Hoodkinked.

COLES VALLEY, Or., June 11, 1910.
Editor News:—If I am not violating any of the "corrupt practice" laws I wish to call the attention of the public to a measure that is designed to be brought before the electors for adoption this fall. It is a matter which I think ought to be thoroughly discussed right now, because if it has merit it will bear investigation, and if it is objectional the people should know it. I will explain what I know about the measure. In company with another gentleman I was in a real estate office in Roseburg some two weeks ago, when H. T. McClallen came in to the place with a petition which he requested the proprietor to sign. The real estate man said: "What have you got here?" and McClallen replied, "It is the strongest prohibition law ever put before the people." Mr. Real Estate then began to read the petition, when McClallen went on to say that "it is a law giving the towns the right to govern themselves without the interference of the country people." The real estate dealer then signed the petition. Neither I nor the gentleman who was with me were asked to sign the document.
I have watched the papers for the past two weeks hoping to see something concerning this proposed measure, but have failed to find anything about it. Since the country people and the busy class have to depend upon the press for their information concerning politicians and their doings, you will do us a great favor by publishing the details regarding the proposed legislation, because we desire to be enabled to vote intelligently on the subject. The people may have very decided views on the proposition of cities and towns making their own laws. It is possible that the voters generally may feel that what is forbidden by law in a country precinct should also govern in the towns, and more particularly in the county seat cities where all the people have an interest. Kindly enlighten us along these lines.

Mr. Vinson's letter is interesting, and doubtless very many people in the country are desiring to know more about the measure that is proposed to give the city privileges that is denied the resident of the rural district, namely the opportunity of selling liquor, even though an overwhelming majority in the county should vote the commonwealth "dry." The measure that is proposed by the friends of the liquor interests is practically the same as the Reddy bill that was introduced and defeated at a former session of the legislature. The petition asking that this proposed constitutional amendment be submitted to the voters has already been filled with the signatures of state, and contained less than 15,000 signatures, although its advocates maintain that 30,000 signatures could readily have been obtained. Therefore, at the November election, every voter will have the privilege of putting himself on record in this matter. It is up to him to say whether or not towns and cities shall have the privilege of permitting license for the sale of intoxicating liquor, regardless of the fact that a majority of all voters in any county might be "dry." In other words, the principle of majority rule that is held dear in hearts of most Americans is to be thrust aside in case this amendment is adopted, and intoxicants may be sold in any town in Oregon against the excessive wishes of a majority of the inhabitants of a county.

PORTLAND'S WHEAT EXPORTS
Is Surpassed Only By New York in Past 11 Months.

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Portland, according to the Department of Commerce and Labor, exported more wheat during the past 11 months than any other port in the United States except New York, its aggregate shipments for that period being 5,745,593 bushels.
Puget Sound's exports amounted to 4,473,999 bushels and, unless abnormally heavy exports are made from the Sound cities during June, Portland will hold the Pacific Coast record for the fiscal year and rank second in the entire country.
Wheat exports everywhere fell be-

low last year, for in the 11 months ending with May, 1909, Portland exported 6,350,933 bushels and Puget Sound 4,627,579 bushels. San Francisco's exports during the past 11 months amounted to only 42,221 bushels.
