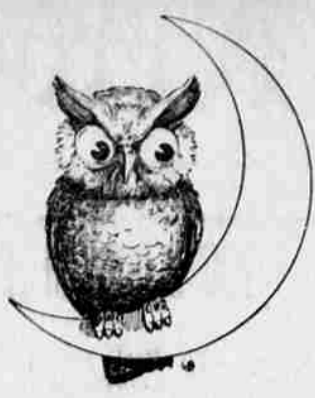

(Special to Evening News) MINNEAPOLIS, June 21.—Serious drought threatens the grain crops of Northwestern Minnesota, North Dakota and Montana with destruction. So far about half the usual rainfall for the season has been enjoyed, and farmers are apprehensive that unless the hot winds and high temperature cease the yield will be cut to at least one half. At Minneapolis yesterday the heat reached 110.
