ALBANY, N. Y., June 21.—The legislature, convened in special session, listened to the reading of a message from Governor Hughes recommending the passage of a direct primary law. The message said that the measure was demanded by a people dissatisfied with the present system of choosing candidates.

**APPROPRIATIONS RUN INTO BILLIONS**  
(Special to Evening News.)  
WASHINGTON, June 21.—One billion and eighty millions of dollars is the sum total that has been appropriated by the present Congress which is the largest in the history of the United States. It is fully thirty-six millions more than the total of any other appropriation by congress. At one o'clock this morning the house

adjourned after passing the public buildings bill which carries an increase of twenty million over former appropriations for this purpose. The "pork barrel" rivers and harbors bill alone carried fifty million, but despite this increase there was a saving along other lines and appropriations for governmental branches unusually receiving immense sums were cut about thirty millions.
