For the benefit of those who think that the recent rains are unusual for this season of the year, it is but necessary to say that the shower of yesterday morning just exactly gives us the annual average precipitation for the month of June, which is 1.07 of an inch. This is for a period of 32 years. In fact we have not received the usual rainfail the country is entitled to since September 1, consequently the "unusual" feature of the weather is in the lack of rain rather than too much. There is a total deficiency in the average rainfall since September 1 of 3.44 inches. Individuals may forget, but the climate does not change.
