Aged Veteran Says It Is Wonderful City.

Since the year 1837, when I was but nine years of age, and at the time I accompanied my parents from New York state to the isolated wilderness, known as Iowa, I have served time in five erstwhile territories, among them being Minnesota, Nebraska, Wyoming, Dakota and Washington. In each of these territories I resided until they became states and were accepted by the union and added to the flag. The last state in which I resided was Washington where I lived in the vicinity of Lake Chelan, for nearly 22 years. Later I moved to Oring, Washington, and finally found my way to Roseburg, locating here less than two weeks ago. Since coming here I have observed the country in a general way, and after viewing the beautiful country adjacent to Roseburg, and after learning from several of the older settlers the conditions of the climate at various times of the year; the richness and fertility of the soil; the wonderful growth and yield of the various cereals and vegetables of all varieties; fruits, both large and small, I have begun to calculate the days before I may become a bonafide resident of this beautiful valley. In addition I might mention the apparent healthfulness of climate, the scenic beauties of the surrounding hills and mountains; the rich and green valleys, productive without the aid of irrigation, and then admit with all candor that I am greatly pleased with Roseburg and Douglas county. My friends, who have located here have done well, and I look forward to the day when Roseburg will be one of the greatest cities of the West, while its adjacent country will fairly weep under the strain of its production.

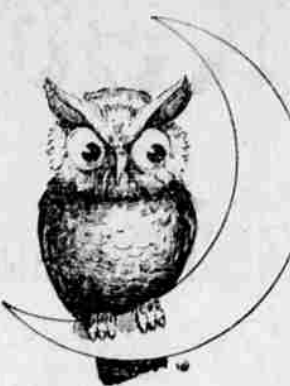
