Together with the Great Northern, the Northern Pacific will carry on a work of exploitation of Oregon. Writers and publicity men are now being enlisted by the line to work up material to be used throughout the country in spreading the knowledge of Oregon broadcast. With the Hill lines actively engaged in the work of publicity, large results can be expected.

Salem, the capital city, will hold its annual cherry fair, beginning July 8. The event promises to be a big affair and has been widely advertised. People from the entire valley are attending and unusual preparations have been made to entertain them. There will be keen competition between the valley counties for prizes in the cherry exhibits and amusement features of the fair will be better than ever.

That high prices for food products are driving many people back to the farm is the belief of those who have given the matter attention. It is contended that not for years has the movement been so noticeable as now. All parts of the Pacific Northwest are being benefited, it is said, by this desertion of the cities and return to the soil. Confidence is expressed that this will balance production and consumption and bring prices of farm products down to lower levels.

The outcome of an experiment to be tried with burned-over timber in Coos county by the Santa Fe Railroad will be watched with interest throughout the Pacific Northwest. If successful, it will mean that large areas of forest, formerly considered useless, will become valuable for the burned-over timber yet remaining. The Santa Fe has contracted for 1200 cedar piling from such a tract in Coos county. If the charred piling proves a success, much more of the same material will be sought by the Santa Fe and a wide market will be found for this now apparently worthless timber.

After Three Months' Journey, Fine Dining Room Furniture Arrives—Beautiful Designs.

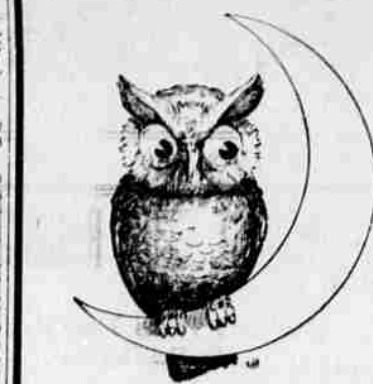

STANDS FOR ASSEMBLIES.

Says It is the Best Possible Method For Selecting Candidates.

Editor News: Assemblies, both county and state, used in conjunction with the primary nominating law are the best possible method of selecting party candidates.

Why? Because a party is given ample opportunity to select good men from among their own ranks, without running independent candidates, or voting for the opposition candidate. Under the old convention system the people had to accept the convention nominees, or vote against their party. Under the primary nominating law as it now is the people must accept what is offered them, be it good, bad, or something else, or vote for the democrat. But under the assembly plan the people representing a party, meet together in advance of both the nominating election and the general election, and suggest good, strong men, who meet the approval of the majority of the assembly. These men then must go before the people for their nomination, thus giving the people a chance before their nomination is made, to defeat any bad selections made by the assembly. The rank and file of the republican party have the power absolutely to defeat the assembly selection, if it be bad. It is giving the people little credence for the democrats to say that the republicans will not defeat an assembly man, if he is not a suitable person. This power is reserved in the rank and file of the republican party, and because of that one potent factor, it is impossible to get back to the old abuses resorted to under the old convention system, because all candidates must pass muster before the party accepts him as their candidate at the general election.

Republicans, the get together spirit is abroad in the land, and you will do well if you turn a deaf ear to the crying democrat, who has your republican party's interest so much at heart, that he tells you your party is split wide open if you even suggest a republican for office, who would meet your approval. Let the "get together" spirit reunite our shattered ranks, caused by Bourneism, and you will see a re-united people, a re-united government, a re-united bond of fellowship, and a continuation of prosperity, such as we have never known before.

ARRANGE FOR MASS MEETING.

Republicans Will Meet in This City Next Saturday.

In accordance with a resolution adopted by the Republican County Central Committee, the republicans of the various precincts throughout the county are arranging for mass meetings on next Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

The meetings in Roseburg precincts West Roseburg precinct, at the Roseburg Hotel.

Umpqua precinct, at the Lane School house.

Deer Creek precinct, at the Court House.

Roseburg precinct, in the firemen's room at the city hall.

All these meetings the delegates will be elected to attend the County Assembly to be held in the court house on Saturday, July 16, 1910.

The manner of electing these delegates will in each precinct be decided according to the wishes of the Republicans attending the meeting.

COUNTY COURT ORDERS.

Several New Precincts Are Established.

In the matter of the establishment of election precincts in Douglas county it is ordered and adjudged that the following precincts be established: An election precinct which shall be known and designated as "Tiller precinct," a precinct which shall be known and designated as "Drew precinct," election precinct to be known and designated as "Drain precinct," comprised of the south half of Drain and the north half of Pass Creek; precinct to be known and designated as "Laird precinct," precinct to be known and designated as "Sutherland precinct," precinct to be known and designated as "Canbyville precinct," comprised of territory from Days Creek precinct.

In the matter of the resignation of J. W. Spaulding, as road supervisor of district No. 20, the same is hereby accepted and Ira Remington is hereby appointed to fill the vacancy.

In the matter of contracts for the operation of the various free ferries of Douglas county, the same having been advertised and bids being now

opened, contracts are awarded to the lowest responsible bidders as follows: Spotsburg ferry awarded to William Beaman at \$18 per month; Smith's ferry awarded to D. C. Higginbotham at \$35 per month; Sawyer's ferry, awarded to Alex Sawyers, at \$365 per year; Poor Farm ferry, awarded to John Natcher, at the rate of \$27.50 per month; Lone Rock ferry, awarded to Thomas J. Hall, at the rate of \$24 per month; Happy Valley ferry awarded to C. D. Fardland at \$25 per month during the time necessary to operate.

Attorney George Neuner stated this morning that he will not be a candidate for representative at the general election, in November, notwithstanding reports to the contrary. Mr. Neuner is of the opinion that he can do more for the party by remaining out of the present campaign, and for that reason he withdrew his name.
