

LYNCHERS ARE JAILED

Ten Citizens are Charged with Crime of Murder

NO BAIL ACCEPTED

Anti Saloon League Planned to Raid Cafe Whose Owner is Among Those Charged With Killing Detective.

(Special to Evening News.)

NEWARK, Ohio, July 13.—Ten citizens charged with participation in the riot that led to the lynching of Detective Etherington have been arrested and are in jail here, bail having been refused for them. All of these men will face the grand jury next Monday, and it is expected that indictments for murder in the first degree will be demanded against all of them by the district attorney. Louis Bolton, a political leader and boss is among those jailed today. Bolton owns the cafe which the anti-saloon league had planned to raid, in the belief that liquors were being illicitly dispensed there. More arrests are sure to follow, and the state authorities say that they have names of the leaders of the riot. Mayor Atherton has refused to resign, although called upon by the governor to do so for neglect of duty in not preventing the death of Etherington. Affidavits are ready at Cleveland charging the mayor with official misconduct, and it is probable that he will be forced to step down and out.

PAVING WORK UNDERWAY.

Graders, Concrete Men and Teams in Great Demand.

In speaking to a News reporter this morning, Mr. B. W. Bickler, superintendent of the street work for the Clark & Henery Co., stated that the curbs were being laid on South Jackson street, while up on East Douglas street the graders were tearing things up in a fashion calculated to inspire everybody with the fact that paving work has begun in earnest. A traction engine and a big plow is used to expedite this part of the work, but Bickler says that every local man who has a team can get work with the company, because

there is a world of dirt to be moved and crushed rock to be hauled. Not only does the company want more teams, but they have plenty of work for a small army of men in the capacity of graders and concrete workers. Talk about hard times, why, any man with any snap in him at all can earn from \$2.50 to \$3.00 per day from now until winter, as the company pays its men from 25 cents to 30 cents per hour for common labor. Men and teams command top figures. Mr. Bickler says that he will employ all the local men he can get, and if he can get sufficient local people will not bring any men in to assist in the paving work. Every man desiring employment of the nature afforded by this work should see Mr. Bickler at once, since the company is desirous of putting on a force that will be able to push the paving as fast as possible.

TEMPEST IN A TEAPOT

German Incident all on Account of Subordinates.

MATTER IS SQUARED

German Papers Follow Lead of the Kaiser and Publish Conciliatory Articles Smoothing Whole Trouble.

BERLIN, July 13.—A case of badly twisted wires seems to be the only explanation of yesterday's tempest, resulting from Germany's attitude toward the United States in the Madriz incident. The whole matter seems to hinge entirely on the mistake of the German foreign office in jumping at the conclusion that the State Department had published the Kaiser's letter to Madriz endorsing his election. When the German officials had exploded prematurely, and then found out that Washington had not published the letter, they did a rapid right-about face. Yesterday the foreign department gave the United Press two statements. One said that Germany absolutely refused to recognize any right of the United States to supervise her diplomatic relations with any Central or South American nation, and the statement amounted to throwing down the gauntlet. The same evening they denied this in a third statement. The last, like the first, was conciliatory in tone, and the German papers, inspired by the action of the government, followed suit and published pacifying articles to smooth down the feeling left by the earlier and caustic editorials.

Posed as Statesman. BERLIN, July 13.—Yesterday's misunderstanding is explained today by the fact that two subordinates in the foreign office endeavored to meet what appeared to be a critical situation. During the absence of Counselor Hamman it is said that they each gave out conflicting statements which were without authority.

CATTLE THIEVES BUSY

Idaho and Nevada Stockmen Suffer Loss.

DROPPED 5000 FEET

Dirigible Balloon Carrying Five Men Exploded and Plunged Earthward Dashing Occupants to Death.

BOISE, July 13.—According to a report just made by Commissioner Day, of the state land office, a band of white cattle rustlers are operating in Southern Idaho and Northern Nevada. It is said that hundreds of cattle have disappeared during the past six months, and cattle men report the discovery of corrals and equipment showing the presence of white men. It is believed that these outlaws have met and annihilated a band of Indian horse thieves, which, until the report of the commissioner was published, have been held guilty for the missing cattle. An investigation has been demanded by the ranchers, and it is altogether probable that Idaho and Nevada will combine to run the outlaws to earth.

Fell From the Sky.

COLOGNE, Germany, July 13.—Carrying five men to death the dirigible balloon, Erelach, fell 5000 feet near Pasched, West Germany, today. The airship was one-sixth as large as Count Zeppelin's dirigible that was wrecked two weeks ago, and had made a number of successful flights. The party ascended from Dusseldorf before sunrise and had been in the air 45 minutes when the accident occurred. Just what happened to cause the disaster will probably never be known, but for some reason the gas bag exploded. Some are of the opinion that the sun shining on the balloon was responsible for the trouble, while others are of the opinion that the gasoline motors burst and the gas was ignited from them.
