Myrtle Creek Mail: The first accidental shooting to occur here this season was the killing of Frank Gregory's fine black mare, while it was in the field near his home, evidently by some hunter. Investigation shows that the animal was shot with a shot gun at close range, the charge taking effect in the breast, there being eleven holes in the animal. Mr. Gregory had recently refused \$250 for her.

Drain Nonpareil: Mr. James A. Sterling, for many years a resident in this vicinity, died at his home on Wednesday last at 3:30 A. M. Mr. Sterling had been failing for some time, and a few months ago was not expected to live. He rallied from that point, and up to three weeks ago had fair to the about again, but death came suddenly upon him, and he is now at rest. Mr. Sterling came to Douglas county in the early 70s and was for some time the postmaster at Oakland, and kept a store there. He came to Drain later on and bought the place in which he lived and died. He was elected assessor for this county, and held the office for about twelve years. He was of Scotch descent, and leaves a widow and two sons, Paul, now living at Coquille, and Edward, of Drain, and also several step-children. The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon, and he was buried in the Odd Fellows cemetery. Rev. Mr. Dunn, of Eugene, officiated. Mr. Sterling was 65 years old.

Armed with a search warrant, Marshal Hoffman, Night Officer Williams, and Special Constable Singleton visited a local bawdy house, on Main street, shortly after 12 o'clock last night, and upon forcing an entrance to the "den" placed the landlady, Agnes Stapleton, and a "lady" friend under arrest. At the time of the raid three well known Roseburg young men were in the place, and according to custom, they will be called as witnesses against the female inmates at the time of the trial. Upon the intrusion of the officers one of the young men attempted to conceal his identity by hiding under a bed, but in this he failed, being ordered to surrender or under penalty of arrest. Marshal Hoffman says that he intends to place the ban on resorts of this nature, and especially the one in question, for the reason that the proprietor promised Judge Hamilton in the circuit court, at a recent session, to refrain from carrying on the questionable traffic hereafter. Formal warrants of arrest will be issued for the female characters this afternoon and their preliminary hearing will probably be held before Justice of the Peace John T. Long sometime Monday.

Last night proved a very busy one for the officers, and between the hours of 6 and 12 o'clock, three "drunks" were landed in the city jail by Marshal Hoffman. When arraigned before City Recorder Orcutt this morning the men gave their names as Pat Burk, G. W. Fanning and Jim Hamilton, and upon interrogation each of the accused entered a plea of guilty. The usual fine of \$5 was imposed, and the three men were remanded to jail to serve the alternate—two and one-half days, for failure to contribute.

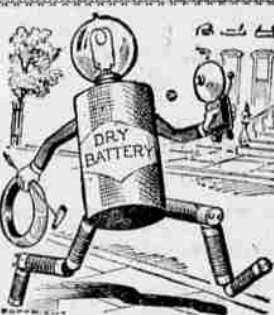
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
