The local forestry office received a message from the forks of the South Umpqua river, about thirty-five miles from Riddle this morning to the effect that one hundred men were needed there immediately to fight the forest fires that are raging in that locality. From the tenor of the message it appears that the fire is beyond control and the ranchers are becoming alarmed. Glaring posters were scattered about the city this morning offering men 25 cents per hour to fight fire, but as yet but thirty have responded. The local forestry office communicated with the state forester at Portland this afternoon and ascertained that as a last resort Company D. O. N. G., of this city could be ordered out through authority of the chief forest ranger, at Washington, D. C. In the event the fire becomes so widespread as to cause unusual alarm the offer will be taken advantage of, and the members of the local militia will be given an opportunity to display their ability as fire fighters.
