Seven Exceed the Twenty Thousand Mark.

By counties Multnomah, contain ing the city of Portland, leads with 226,261. In addition to Multuomah there are seven counties with population exceeding 20,000. These, in the order of their strength are; Mar ion, 39,780; Lane, 33,783; Clacka-mas, 25,931; Jackson, 25,756; Linn, 22,662; Washington, 21,522; Uma-tilla, 20,704.
