Using Daniel Phillips as a human worm, a man too small to admit he had broken the law, Attorney Boyce, Mrs. Schenk's chief counsel, resumed his argument today. Arraigning Phillips he said: "He is a man who Shenk, I believe, has a right to kill. Not only did he betray the husband, but he also betrayed the woman who lavished her gifts on him." After a severe arraignment of the defendant by Prosecutor Fate, the case went to the jury at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

**Author Phillips Buried.**

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—The body of Phillips, the author, who died of his wounds late last night, was taken to the National Arts Club today. Senator Beveridge was in charge of the removal of the body from the hospital to the club, the funeral will be held in the little church near the club, but no hour has been set for the services. He will be buried in Indiana. Phillips made a brave struggle for life, but died at 11 o'clock. The body of the man Goldsborough, who shot Phillips at the door of the club, and afterwards suicided, was taken to Washington where it was buried by his family. The police are convinced that the man was insane.

**Carnegie Talks of Canal.**

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—Fortification of the Panama Canal will in no way be incompatible with the world-wide peace agreement between the nations, according to a statement made by Andrew Carnegie today, who recently donated a ten million dollar fund toward the abolishment of war. No nation can dispute our right to fortify the canal, said Carnegie. It would be a war protest, but purely defensive, and the Panama forts would never fire a shot unless the canal should be endangered by an enemy, which means the enemy of other nations as well, because an injury to the canal would injure the world's commerce.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—After a sharp fight the house rules committee decided today to report the rule, setting Tuesday next as the day for the vote on the location of the Panama Exposition. Congressman Kahn, of California, and Chariman Rodenberg, of Illinois, leaders of the opposing factions, became personal in their arguments before the date was established for the vote.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 25.—The census of Oregon was officially given today as 672,745. Of this number 655,470 are whites, 1,520 negroes, 5,001 Indians, 7,317 Chinese, 3,256 Japs and miscellaneous nationalities 25. Douglas county is credited with 19,674.
