SALZEM, Feb. 2.—Intermarriage by whites with aliens is the subject of further legislation in a bill proposed today by Representative Peterson. This bill amends the present statute by making it unlawful for any white person to marry a Japanese or a Hindu or a person having one-fourth or more Japanese or Hindu blood.

House Bills Pass Senate. House bills passed the senate today as follows. Abbott—Providing for a free ferry at St. Johns. Brooke—Regulating terms of supreme court in Eastern Oregon. Buchanan—Regulating applicants for Soldiers' Home at Roseburg. Thompson—Prohibiting disposal of state or county funds. Ambrose—Regulating practice of optometry. Steelhammer—Restricting age of engineers and whistle boys on donkey engines. Reynolds—Regulating fees for inspection by labor commissioner. Miller (Columbia)—Placing county liquor license at \$400 for six months. Buchanan—Abolishing whipping post. Fouts—Prohibiting transportation of explosives on passenger trains. Beals—Naming time for holding county court in various counties of the state.
