ADMIRAL DEWEY TALKS PEACE.

Believes in Arbitration—No Trouble From Japanese Source.

WASHINGTON, March 18.—Admiral George Dewey in a statement to the United Press declared that he sympathized with the arbitration views of Admiral Lord Berosford, but that he was not sanguine of their application for many years.

Dewey referred to Berosford's statement that "America is absolutely invulnerable" as a compliment, adding: "There have always been people in this country ready to criticize the army and navy in magazines, but that was the case too, before the beginning of the civil war."

Asked about the reported danger of Japan seizing the Pacific coast through sudden attack, Dewey said: "It would take Japan a year to bring 100,000 men over. But there is no reason why they should be brought. The question of immigration appears to have been settled to the general satisfaction of both nations and there seems to be no other question at issue."

Taft Holds Steel Stock.

SEATTLE, March 18.—More than \$18,000,000 will be invested by English capitalists in the plants of the Western Steel Corporation near Seattle, according to James A. Moore, president. Moore says the money will be expended in extending the operations of the steel mills at Irondale and New Westminister, B. C., in the near future.

Prohibition Amendment Killed. DES MOINES, March 18.—Prohibition via the constitutional amendment route has been killed by the Iowa legislature, after a number of heated debates.

Italy's Murder Laws Rigid.

MILAN, March 18.—Should Porter Charlton be convicted of the murder of his wife, Mary Scott Charlton, at Lake Como, lawyers predicted today that he would not be given the limit of the law.

Under the Italian law, capital punishment is forbidden, but the young American stands in danger of a sentence of penal servitude for life. The best he would get would be a twenty-five year term.

ent meeting, therefore would be absolutely legal. A prolonged discussion followed, and finally Mr. Eddy became aroused, and peering at Attorney Gardwell and Neuter remarked:

"I am not here for the purpose of instituting a kindergarten." Considerable laughter followed, and upon restoring order Chairman Fullerton submitted the motion as amended, as follows:

"That the school board of Roseburg school district No. 4, be authorized to issue bonds in the sum of \$20,000, for the erection of a grade school, the purchase of a site, and purchasing the necessary furnishings." The motion also carried a clause annulling the bond issue in the sum of \$75,000 authorized last fall.

Upon motion the members of the Roseburg school board were appointed as a committee to ascertain available sites, and report the same at the adjourned meeting to be held two weeks hence. Without further discussion the balloting was commenced. The meeting was well attended and intense interest prevailed throughout.
