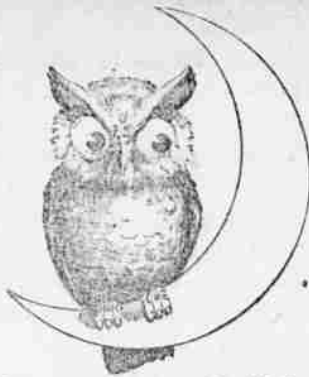


LOCAL NEWS.

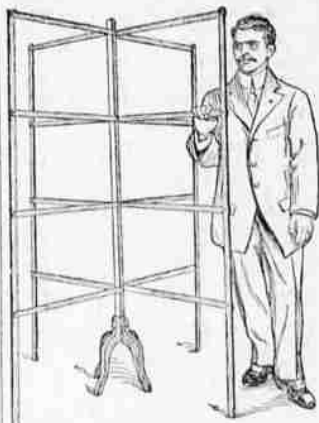
