Another daring burglary, bearing the earmarks of professionalism, occurred in Roseburg some time last night, when some unknown person or persons entered the L. H. Rhoades second hand store, near the corner of Jackson and Cass streets, and appropriated merchandise of the approximate value of \$750. The robbery was discovered by one of the clerks upon opening the establishment for business this morning, and upon brief investigation, it was found that the burglars had effected entrance through a rear window which was unboltsed. Once inside of the store the men made their way to the gun rack where they selected a .32-20 Martin rifle as well as two revolvers one of which was of the .22 caliber Colt variety. The men then unlocked the show cases and as near as can be ascertained, appropriated about twenty-five watch-fifteen purses, twenty phones, two hunting knives a number of axes, and an unlimited supply of cartridges. As soon as the robbery was discovered, the affair was reported to Sheriff Quinn and Marshal Huffman, who are now searching for the guilty parties. It is the belief of the officers that the burglars are experienced in their profession and are well armed, as is indicated by the articles selected by them while inside the store. All officers along the line of the Sutherlin Pacific railroad, both north and south, have been instructed to keep a close watch for the men, who will probably attempt to dispose of the plunder upon leaving Roseburg.

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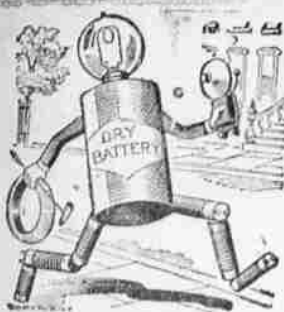
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
