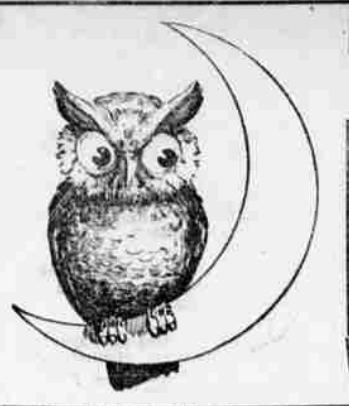

A BLUFF SUICIDE.

Well Known Roseburg Man Attempts to Frighten Wife.

S. K. Unstott, who has been estranged from his family for about two months, created no little sensation this morning, when he made a feeble and unsuccessful attempt to commit suicide.

According to the story told by the officers, Unstott called at the home of his wife, who resides with her parents in the Grove at about 9 o'clock this morning, and upon gaining admittance, attempted to bring about reconciliation. Falling in his mission, he is said to have pulled from his pocket a vial partly filled with carbolic acid, at the same time informing the frightened woman that he was tired of life and intended to commit suicide. He then poured about four or five drops of the drug into a glass of water, swallowed the same, and left the house. Almost hysterical, the wife notified neighbors of what had occurred, and the affair was later reported to the officers. Owing to the fact that Unstott drank but a small amount of the acid, he was little harmed, and is about the streets as usual this afternoon.

The officers believe that Unstott had no intention of committing suicide, but on the contrary, was simply attempting to frighten his wife. Upon being apprehended by the officers today, Unstott promised to refrain from visiting his wife in the future, and thus avoid similar demonstrations to the one which occurred this morning.

According to Marshal Huffman, Unstott has been causing considerable trouble in the vicinity of his former home of late, and upon several occasions the officers have been called to restore quietness. Until recently Unstott was employed by the county, having charge of the gang of men working on the road near Cannon Mountain.

D. P. Mortenson, formerly deputy sheriff at Glendale, arrived in Roseburg this afternoon to spend a couple of days attending to business matters.

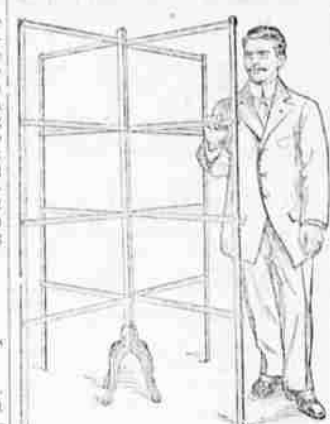
