GRAND LODGE IN SESSION.
 Masonic Chiefs Assemble at Portland Today.

PORTLAND, June 14.—As grand master, United States Judge Wolverson at 10 o'clock this morning in the Masonic temple at West Park and Yamhill streets, called to order the 61st annual convention of the Oregon Grand Lodge of Masons. An attendance of 250 delegates is expected at the convention, which will not conclude its work until Friday afternoon.

Immediately following the opening of the grand lodge this morning, the exercise of receiving formally the representatives of other jurisdictions, of whom about 40 are expected, will be carried out. The annual address of the retiring grand master, Judge Wolverson, will be followed by the annual reports from the various officers and committees of the state organization. The annual election of officers may take place this afternoon, although an effort will be made to defer this work until tomorrow or Friday.

The purpose of seeking to postpone the selection of new officers is to enable the delegates to consider a revised constitution which will be presented for their discussion. If officers for the ensuing year are not chosen this afternoon it is likely the proposed new constitution will be considered at a special meeting either tonight or tomorrow night. The constitution that has been drafted as a substitute for the one under which the grand lodge is now proceeding, makes many important changes affecting the general management of the craft. The champions of the new constitution are contending that it should be considered thoroughly before the lodge proceeds to the election of officers. Otherwise, if the new document should be adopted before final adjournment, conflict would result from the fact that the officers for the ensuing year would have been elected under the old constitution and naturally governable under and by its provisions.

EASTER STAR OFFICERS.
 Baker City Woman Heads List for The Ensuing Year.

PORTLAND, June 14.—Mrs. Pauline Moore Riley, of Baker, will be the official head of the Grand Chapter of Oregon, Order of Eastern Star, for the ensuing year, having been elected grand worthy matron at the 22nd annual convention of the Eastern Star in this city yesterday. Clyde Evans, of this city, in the same election, was made worthy grand patron.

Other officers elected by the Eastern Star delegates yesterday were:

Assistant grand matron, Mrs. Margaret V. Hayter, of Dallas; assistant grand patron, James E. Godfrey, of Salem; grand secretary, Miss Nellie McKinley, of Portland; grand treasurer, Mrs. Mary E. Johnson, of Pendleton; grand conductress, Mrs. Mary M. Reischer, of Condon; assistant grand conductress, Mrs. Nellie McGowan, of Medford.

Formal installation of these officers will take place tomorrow afternoon when Mrs. Riley, worthy grand matron-elect, will announce the appointment of candidates to the appointive stations in the state organization.

The sessions of the convention were opened yesterday by Mrs. Jennie Rhinehart, of La Grande, and Hugh J. Boyd, of Portland, retiring grand worthy matron and grand worthy patron, respectively. The address of welcome was given by Mrs. Hattie L. Aldrich, worthy matron of Camella Chapter, No. 27, to which Mrs. Pauline Moore made the response.

The morning session was occupied by the appointment of committees, reception of visitors and the annual reports of the officers which showed the organization to be in a most flourishing condition with approximately 9,000 members. During the year many new chapters were organized.

Following her annual address, Mrs. Rhinehart, the retiring grand worthy matron, was presented with a cut-glass salver in appreciation of her official services during the last year.

The afternoon session was devoted to the election of officers and the customary memorial exercises were held last night. The sessions today were taken up in the consideration of routine business entirely with an exemplification by the grand officers tonight of the ritualistic work. The installation of the newly-elected officers tomorrow afternoon, which will conclude the work of the convention, will be under the direction of Mrs. A. Antoinette Sillis, past grand worthy matron.
