At a well attended meeting held in the firemen's chamber in the city hall last evening, definite steps were taken in the direction of organizing a temporary fire department. The meeting was in charge of S. K. Sykes, chairman of the board of fire commissioners, who appointed C. L. Parrott, as chief of the department.

James Perry was appointed assistant chief, while H. T. McClallen was elected secretary. A committee composed of H. T. McClallen, James Zureher and Joseph Sykes was appointed to draft suitable by-laws and have the same in readiness to submit to the consideration of the department at another meeting to be held on next Tuesday night. The department will be segregated into three distinct companies, each of which will have a captain who will work under the direction of the chief. One of these companies will have direct charge of the chemical engine; another the hook and ladder truck, and the third the hose cart. Fred Wright and Sam Rast were appointed as a special committee to repair the chemical engine, and under it useful in time of fire. At the next meeting of the organization permanent officers will be selected.

Two fire alarms in quick succession caused considerable excitement in the city about 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The first fire was discovered in Pastor Brother's paint shop, adjoining the Grand hotel, on Cass street. The department responded promptly, and extinguished the blaze, which was confined to roof, without great difficulty. It is presumed that the fire caught from a lighted cigar stub carelessly thrown out of one of the windows in the hotel. In response to the second alarm the department hastened to North Roseburg, where they found the residence, formerly occupied by Thomas Jennie, on fire. Owing to the fact that there is no fire hydrant in that part of the structure burned to the ground. Adjoining buildings were saved through the aid of garden hoses, the hands of willing workers. Mr. Jennie recently moved out of the building, and consequently his loss is nominal. In their haste to reach the fire two of the hose carts were more or less demolished, and are at present in the shop pending repairs. The origin of the latter fire is a mystery, and it is generally supposed that it caught from a spark from a neighboring chimney.

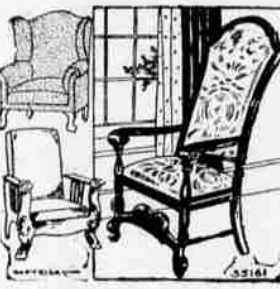
