Miss Lorine Ward, of Ashland, arrived here this noon to spend the remainder of the summer at the R. S. Barker ranch, on Deer Creek.

Russell Dunham, one of the efficient clerks at the Rockdale, met with an accident yesterday afternoon that may lay him up for several days, he having slipped and fell.

Geo. L. Hall and Miss Eva McCoy, both of Edenhower, were married at the parsonage of the M. E. church in this city last evening. Rev. E. Olin Eldridge, pastor, officiating. The young people will begin housekeeping in the cozy home that the groom provided for his bride. Mr. and Mrs. Hall have many friends in this city and vicinity who wish for them a long and happy wedded life.

An adjutant of the Horticultural Fire Relief Company of Oregon, with headquarters at Salem, arrived here last evening and this morning presented a check for \$1000 to the Grand Hotel, with a check covering the damage to that structure as a result of the recent fire which destroyed Taylor Brothers' paint shop. Mr. Marsters says that the Horticultural Fire Relief Company is the first to have a representative on the ground, much to the credit of James H. Pruitt, the local agent.

At a special meeting of the Board of Fire Commissioners and the chief of the Roseburg Fire Department held last night, fire escapes were ordered installed on the following buildings: McClallen hotel, two escapes; Harrington hotel, one escape; Masonic Temple, one escape. The owners of the several buildings are given thirty days within which to comply with the order. A member of the board of fire commissioners stated this morning that every effort would be made to protect life in this city, and consequently it was considered compulsory to issue orders for fire escapes which are a necessity at this time.

Sheriff George Quine and Deputy Sheriff Sam Starnier returned here last night after a day spent in the vicinity of Comstock, searching for the two highwaymen who are accused of holding up and robbing J. B. Beartee, of Roseburg, of about \$25. Mr. Beartee is a retired Christian minister and resides at the corner of Fullerton and Tenth streets. He was enroute from Roseburg to Albany when the hold up occurred. At the time the sheriff arrived at Comstock a blood hound was taken to the scene of the robbery, but failed to pick up a scent. Sheriff Quine believes that the highwaymen reside some where in the vicinity of Albany and he hopes to effect their capture shortly.

**COOS BAY ROAD SOLD.**

Railroad Promoted By Clarke Taken Over By New Company.

MARSHFIELD, Or., July 5.—There was filed in the office of the county clerk at Coquille today a deed of conveyance of the Coos Bay, Oregon & Idaho Railroad to the Coos Bay & Oregon Central Railroad. The consideration named was \$1, and the deed conveys the rights-of-way and other property and holdings of the first named company.

The conveyance is made by Francis H. Clarke, acting as attorney in fact, and with the deed was filed a power of attorney from the railroad company to Clarke.

The Coos Bay, Oregon & Idaho Railroad is the one which has been promoted by Clarke the past year. Surveys for rights-of-way were made from this city to Roseburg. Which there is nothing to indicate the intent of the transfer. It is assumed that the Coos Bay & Oregon Central is a new holding company and that the transfer is a preliminary step toward the materialization of the road.
