FOREST FIRES RAGING.
Crew of Men Leave For Hoaglin To Fight Flames.

HOAGLIN, Ore., July 28.—District Rangers E. E. Harpham and E. H. Lough arrived at this place last night and reported a number of forest fires burning up the North Umpqua river; one near the Glen Echo station, two near the Hillhee, one on Steamboat creek and another at Mountain Meadows. These fires were started as a result of an electric storm occurring last Monday night. Mr. Harpham and Mr. Lough are organizing a crew of fire fighters, securing packers and pack animals, preparatory to the prompt suppression of same.
Forest Supervisor S. C. Bartram some time ago made Hoaglin general headquarters for supply and equipment station preparatory to an emergency of this kind. Consequently, all that is needed is the organization of a crew of men and pack animals to get men and supplies to the fire, which under the present arrangements can be done very quickly. Fourteen men from Roseburg are on their way and will reach Hoaglin tonight and will be working on the various fires not later than tomorrow. Everyone in this section of the country is lending the forest service every possible assistance in this important matter as they all appreciate the magnitude of the forest wealth lying in the North Umpqua Basin. McMillen Bros. are exerting every effort in their power and will leave with a pack load of supplies about midnight tonight. The promptness expressed by the forest officials and those immediately assisting them will undoubtedly suppress these numerous fires before any material damage is done.

MISS BOGGESS EXPIRES.
Miss Myrtle Boggess, daughter of Mrs. Martha Ragan, who resides about 9 miles east of Roseburg, on South Deer Creek, died shortly after 3 o'clock this afternoon after an illness of nearly eighteen months. Death was the result of tuberculosis. Aside from a heartbroken mother the deceased is survived by three sisters, Mrs. Sherman Conline, Mrs. E. C. Davis and Miss Alberta Boggess, and one brother, Floyd Boggess, all of whom reside on South Deer Creek. No arrangements had been made for the funeral up to a late hour this afternoon. Miss Boggess was 21 years of age and a native Douglas county girl. She was well known in Roseburg where she was employed in various capacities prior to her illness. Having many friends in this locality, the news of Miss Boggess' death was received with sincere regret.

WILDE TO RETURN.
Governor Johnson Will Sign Extradition Papers.
SAN FRANCISCO, July 27.—Governor Johnson will sign extradition papers for the return of Louis J. Wilde, under indictment in Portland for alleged embezzlement, to Oregon. The decision was reached tonight at a conference at which Johnson District Attorney Cameron and R. H. Sumner, attorney for Wilde, were present. The governor refused the extradition papers last Saturday, declaring the allegations made by Cameron were not sufficient to warrant such a proceeding. Cameron presented additional facts to Attorney General Webb which the governor accepted tonight as satisfactory. Sumner said Wilde will return to Portland.
