Several years later. They eventually located at Glendale, at which place they have since lived. Among other allegations, Mrs. Bangert alleged that her husband treated her in a cruel and inhuman manner, and on one occasion went so far as to eject herself and baby from their bed at one o'clock in the morning. She also claimed that he utterly failed to provide for herself and children, and that she was forced to work in order to obtain those things necessary in sustaining life. In January, 1910, she says he became so violent that she was compelled to leave him and seek shelter elsewhere.

According to advices received at the district attorney's office late this afternoon from Glendale, Hester also participated in the "near tragedy", which resulted in his being shot over the right eye. Deputy Sheriff Lawson informed the district attorney this afternoon that Hester fired two shots, while Bangert fired three shots. The trouble originated over the possession of the ranch occupied by Hester, and an irrigation ditch which runs through the property. Deputy Sheriff Lawson says that each man claims to have attacked, and that the true state of facts will not be known until brought to trial. Hester is at Glendale where he is receiving medical treatment.

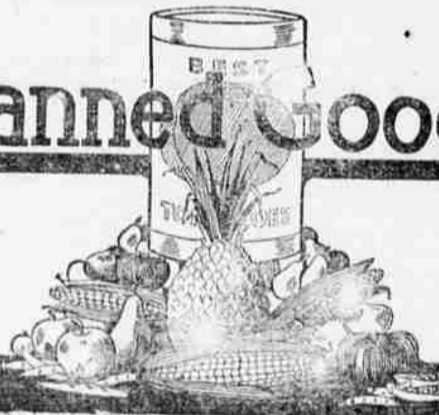
This cot will hold many hundreds of pounds, yet it weighs but 17 pounds itself. And it folds up so that it can be carried like a suit case or put on the back of a horse.
